
What is Second Chance?

In 2018, UN Women initiated the development of the Second Chance Education and Vocational Learning (SCE) programme that would provide marginalized women who have lost out on an education with pathways to employment through a tailored learn-to-earn approach. The ongoing programme is aimed at empowerment of the most marginalized women who, owing to poverty and gender-based discrimination, have been denied access to opportunities at an early age.

The programme undertakes a holistic approach to empowerment using the pathways of learning, employment and entrepreneurship. The SCE programme enables and offers women opportunities to (1) re-enter into formal education, (2) undertake vocational education and (3) receive entrepreneurship training and skills and 4) potential employment. SCE offers a comprehensive solution by adopting a holistic approach, leveraging partnerships at all levels, using innovative pedagogies and finance to achieve its objective. SCE is being implemented in 12 districts across 4 states of India – Bihar, Maharashtra, Odisha and Rajasthan, covering 200 villages.

Skill training

DDU-GKY stands for Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana - it is one of the initiatives by the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India, that seeks to promote rural livelihoods.






Rural self-employment

Sewing Machine Operator Training

Four women from Odisha left for Sahana Clothing pvt. ltd. in Tiruppur (Tamil Nadu) for SMO (Sewing Machine Operator) training. This was facilitated by the SCE programme lead partner PRADAN (Professional Assistance for Development Action) and implementing partner Aaina NGO in Odisha.



Rashmi's Story...



Rashmi Ranjan, is a 21-year-old girl from Pilkhi Gajpati village of Muraul block, in the Muzaffarpur district (Bihar, India). After completing her senior year of high school i.e. Class 12th, she had to take up teaching at a coaching institute in order to finance her higher studies. She managed to put together all available resources at her disposal in order to complete her graduation. After this, she started looking for a job, in order to financially support her family.

UN Women's Second Chance Education and Vocational Learning (SCE) Programme in India (launched in 2019) Muzaffarpur district), enabled her to find employment opportunities alongside economic independence. She was selected as one of the beneficiaries under the programme. She visited Yuva Junction center in her village. The Yuva Junction center is an initiative by AKRSP to provide support to the youth in villages of India. The Aga Khan Rural Support Programme – India (AKRSP) is a consortium partner for the SCE programme in India.



She was enrolled in a three-month computer course (skill development training). After the skill training, she also received placement support. She received an offer from Dr. Reddy Foundation, in Tajpur (West Bengal, India). The job offered her a monthly salary of INR 10500/. Her spirited effort and dedication alongside targeted programmatic interventions, enabled her to become financially independent and support her family.

NIOS (National Institute of Open Schooling)

The National Institute of Open Schooling from India wins the UNESCO King Sejong Literacy Prize 2021 for its programme 'Enabling education of persons with disabilities through technology enabled inclusive learning material, with specific focus on Indian Sign language based content'. The National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) is an autonomous organisation under the Ministry of Education in India, aiming to provide quality education to all through open and distance learning. It focuses on the educational needs of persons with disabilities, particularly deaf and hard-of-hearing learners, and other minority groups. It is the largest open schooling system in the world.





UN Women's Second Chance Education and Vocational Learning (SCE) Programme in India identified the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) as the partner for developing a pathway back to formal education for girls and women who have not completed their basic education.

Through a network of 54 community educators across the 12 programme districts, the Second Chance Education programme, has enrolled 3,648 women and girls in formal education. Out of this, 2,096 have successfully completed their Secondary and Higher Secondary, with the National Institute of Open Schooling or State Open Schooling System.












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
