What is Second Chance?

In 2018, UN Women initiated the development of the Second Chance Education and Vocational Learning (SCE) programme that would provide marginalized women who have lost out on an education with pathways to employment through a tailored learn-toearn approach. The ongoing programme is aimed at empowerment of the most marginalized women who, owing to poverty and gender-based discrimination, have been denied access to opportunities at an early age.

The programme undertakes a holistic approach to empowerment using the pathways of learning, entrepreneurship. employment and The SCE programme enables and offers women opportunities to (1) re-enter into formal education, (2) undertake vocational education and (3) receive entrepreneurship training and skills and (4) potential employment. SCE offers a comprehensive solution by adopting a holistic approach, leveraging partnerships at all levels, using innovative pedagogies and finance to achieve its objective. SCE is being implemented in 12 districts across 4 states of India - Bihar, Maharashtra, Odisha and Rajasthan, covering 200 villages.

SCE INDIA SPOTLIGHT: FIELD VISIT TO ODISHA

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In Odisha, the SCE programme is being implemented at 3 districts in 4 blocks namely Dhenkanal (Kamakhyanagar and Kankadahad), (Kolnara) Mayurbhanj Ravagada and (Thakurmunda). The programme is being **PRADAN** (Professional implemented by Assistance for Development Action) as the lead with consortium partners Aaina, Development Alternative, B-Able and Shristi in Odisha.

During her first official visit to Odisha (21st to 23rd September, 2021), UN Women India Country Representative Susan Ferguson met with government officials and women on the ground, and stressed on the importance of education and skilling of women and girls for building back better.

- In Odisha, till date 1202 women and girls have enrolled out of which 889 women and girls have completed their secondary or higher secondary education.
- 695 women and girls are enrolled for trainings across various skills and 114 women and girls, across the three districts have been placed in jobs such as home nurse, textile and garment factories.
- Till 2021, 1863 women which includes 899 women in Odisha have started their own businesses, using micro-financing from Self-Help Groups (SHG) and personal funds.
- From Odisha, 68 nurses and nurse assistants were also trained in Covid management and response.

IN CONVERSATION WITH SRIMATI PINGUA



At age 38, Srimati Pingua rejoined formal education through UN Women's Second Chance Education Programme, along with her two daughters. She recently passed her 10th standard examination, which marks the completion of secondary school in India. and received the certificate from UN Women Representative in India, Susan Ferguson, during her first official visit to Odisha.

Q: When did you join the Women Empowerment Hub/SCE programme? I joined the programme in February 2020.

Q: What kind of skills are you learning here?

Alongside being enrolled in formal education, I am also learning how to use the Computer and the Internet.

Q: What kind of work did you do before joining the Women Empowerment Hub? I continue to work as an Angwadi Worker (AWW).

Q: How have the Women Empowerment Hub and the skills you are learning there, helping you?

I have learned new things like the computer. I am also more confident now when it comes to talking in front of everyone. These skills will also help me in getting a promotion at work.

Q: How has Covid-19 impacted you in the last year and a half?

My children's education was affected and financially we were also impacted due to the lock-down as my husband did not have a regular source of employment.

Q: Why is it important for women to have formal education or find jobs and have their own income? It will help every woman to become financially independent.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS

123 women participated in the Empowerment and Entrepreneurship Development initiative for Women Entrepreneurs organized in Baran (Rajasthan), as part of the SCE programme. Training modules have been developed by the Indian Institute of Management (Lucknow) and the Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI). This training (Sept to Oct 2021) will enable women to develop their businesses, increase their livelihood, alongside learning new technology.







The SCE programme team with support from the District Administration in Mayurbhanj (Odisha) organized a block level entrepreneur training session for women. 25 women attended the training.







13 young women from Rayagada (Odisha), have recently begun their on-the-job training at the Continental Hospitals in Hyderabad. They have completed their GDA (General Duty Assistant) training at the Vigyan Bharati Charitable Trust Skill Development Cell (Bhubaneswar, Odisha).



The webinar - 'Build Back Better: Equal Spaces for Women in the Workforce' was held on 30th September, 2021. This webinar aimed to discuss the challenges that Indian women face in the workplace and the opportunities that diverse stakeholders such as the government, the private sector, the civil society, and the community can provide for women to thrive in the workforce. To make substantial in increasing women's economic strides empowerment, a gender lens needs to be incorporated at every stage in the policy making and implementation phase.
